2018 ASA AGM AND CONFERENCE DAY

The 2018 ASA AGM held in Western Australia was a great success with thirty-five monastics and a number of lay people from around Australia attending. As well as successfully trialling livestreaming the AGM on Mixlr, two other new initiatives included holding discussion groups and conducting a nuns' Vinaya training day.

This year attendees had an opportunity to break into **discussion groups** to talk about issues they identified as important to them. Groups met to discuss Buddhist chaplaincy services; conducting a survey of Australian Buddhist monastics; and Bhante Sujato led a group in which he spoke about his recent projects, the launch of SuttaCentral and translating the four Pali nikāyas.

Since 2004 Bhante Sujato has been working with an international team of scholars to develop the website <u>https://suttacentral.net/</u>. Their focus is on the Pali Tipiṭaka as well as texts in other languages that are similar or related to these. They have gathered over 70,000 texts, including original texts in Pali, Sanskrit, Chinese, and Tibetan, and translations in over 30 modern languages. Bhante Sujato has also completed a modern English translation of the central Buddhist scriptures, the four nikāyas. It is released into the public domain, completely free of any copyright claims. It has been published on SuttaCentral and print editions will be produced in due course.



The day after the AGM Venerable Pasada (pictured on the left) from Dhammasara Nuns Monastery facilitated the **nuns' Vinaya training day** which was well attended by twenty nuns (from all three traditions) and five monks. There was a great deal of lively discussion about various aspects of the Vinaya and a number of nuns requested we conduct a similar event next year.

At this year's AGM we highlighted the **ASA's Policy Papers** which can be found on the ASA website, and in particular the new ASA statement on "Eliminating Violence and Discrimination: With a Special Emphasis on Women and Children" To find out more go to <u>www.australiansangha.org/policy-papers</u>

Recently Bhante Sujato attended a meeting of the Australian Partnership of Religious Organisations (APRO) on behalf of the ASA. The ASA, along with the Federation of Australian Buddhist Councils (FABC), has represented the Buddhist community on APRO for more than a decade.

The main focus of this meeting was preparation for a forum later this year. The title of the forum will be "Building Relationships" and it will focus on fostering positive community harmony in the face of hate and extremism.

We will update you on further details of the forum as they are settled. Other issues discussed include the new child safety legislation pending in most States; the political influence of minority religions; and the influence of foreign governments on local religious communities.
